Next, she incorporated elements from local artists and artisans, including custom artwork and a bookcase. The wing chairs were thrift store finds that were recovered with new fabric and repainted by Angelfish Studios. LeMaster believes every piece in the room has a story behind it and contributes to the relaxing and imaginative feel of the space.
